Dr. Albert Iosue graduated with honors from Collinwood High School in 1958. He played junior and varsity football as a halfback although he was primarily a defensive back.

Through a stroke of good fortune, Albert was able to attend Western Reserve University because the university was willing to pay half of his tuition and wanted him to play football for them.

He played football as a star wide receiver for Western Reserve. In 1957 Albert was chosen for the Scholar Athlete Award from the Midwest, one of only seven selected nationally. He was introduced to President John F. Kennedy at the awards banquet. Albert majored in chemistry and after graduating magna cum laude he attended Case Western Reserve School of Medicine.

In 1967 Albert placed second on the Ohio State Medical Board Examination. Albert did his internship in medicine and pediatrics at the University of Vermont.

He served as a doctor for the Peace Corps in Ecuador from 1967-1969. Albert studied diagnostic radiology and nuclear medicine at Yale University's New Haven Hospital and became board certified in both specialties.

Albert was the chief radiologist at North Beach Hospital for twenty years. During this time the fields of medicine and radiology were growing immensely and he had to study to keep up with the new developments and technologies.

In 1988 Albert formed The Institute For Applied Philosophy, which is a nonprofit organization designed to foster philosophical thought and discussion outside of learning institutions.

Albert married Patricia Blair and they are the proud parents of three sons and one daughter.
